Instructions to Teachers/Tutors

Centres should refer to the *Instructions for Conducting External Assessments (ICEA)* document for full information on the correct conduct of monitored preparation and formal supervision.

This set task has a preparatory period. **Part A** sets out how learners should prepare for the completion of the set task.

Part A is given to learners before **Part B** is scheduled by Pearson.

Part A must be given to learners on the specified date so that learners can carry out monitored independent research in response to the information given in **Part A**.

Part B contains unseen material and is issued to learners at the start of the specified formal supervised assessment session as timetabled by Pearson.

Learners should be monitored in **six** scheduled hours provided by the centre for learners to read **Part A**, carry out their research and compile their notes for the **Part B** assessment. During this time, they may have access to the internet, books, magazines, brochures, journals, case studies, class notes and notes from visiting subject experts or guest speakers. Learners must work independently and must not be given guidance or feedback on the completion of the preparatory work. Learners must not prepare potential responses.

Only notes produced in the monitored preparation sessions may be used during the formal supervised assessment.

Learners' notes are the outcome of independent preparation and support learners in responding to the additional information and activities presented in **Part B**.

Learners' notes are restricted to:

- up to four sides of A4
- bullet points and quotes from the research only
- references to specific sources (where applicable).

They must not include:

- · continuous prose
- essay plans
- pre-prepared answers.

The notes must be hard copies and can be handwritten or word processed. If word processed, the font size must be 12 points minimum.

Part B is completed under formal supervision. The supervised assessment uses the **Part B** booklet. This is a task book. The supervised assessment will take place in a **three-hour** session timetabled by Pearson. A supervised rest break is permitted.

Teachers/tutors should note that:

- learners should not be given any direct guidance or prepared materials
- learners should not be given any support in writing or editing notes
- all work must be completed independently by the learner
- learner notes produced under monitored conditions must be checked to ensure that they comply with the limitations
- learner notes should be retained by the centre between the monitored sessions and the formal supervised assessment
- learner notes should be retained by the centre after the completion of assessment and may be requested by Pearson.

In **Part B** you will be asked to carry out specific (written) activities using the information in this **Part A** booklet and your own research on this topic.

You will complete **Part B** under formal supervision.

There will be **three** activities in the **Part B** formal assessment.

Activity 1: an article on Dubai as a tourist destination

Activity 2: an email about travel itineraries

Activity 3: a report on the popularity of global destinations

Set Task

There will be **three** activities in the **Part B** formal assessment.

To prepare to answer **Activity 1** and **Activity 3** of the **Part B** formal assessment, you must do **six** hours of research under monitored conditions.

You must produce summary research notes to take into the **Part B** formal assessment to support your responses to **Activity 1** and **Activity 3**.

Your notes must be:

- up to four sides of A4
- bullet points and quotes from the research only
- references to specific sources (where applicable).

They must not include:

- continuous prose
- essay plans
- pre-prepared answers.

Your notes must be hard copies and can be handwritten or word processed. If your notes are word processed, you must use font size 12 or more.

Activity 1

The growth of Dubai as a tourist destination

Dubai is a city in the United Arab Emirates. Originally Dubai was a small fishing village. In 1960 oil was discovered and Dubai began to change. By the mid-1980s oil reserves were running low and it was decided to diversify the economy and develop Dubai as a tourist destination. In May 2002 for the first time, non-nationals were allowed to buy land in Dubai.

In 2015 over 14 million tourists visited Dubai.
